Title: Year Up job-training program helps students find success

Year Up has helped thousands of students get job training and find work with top employers — but the organization is having some trouble convincing potential participants that it's not a scam.

"It sounds way too good to be true," said Zach Rivera, a current Year Up student from Newark, Delaware. "It's free, you get paid off of it ... nobody would believe that that's possible."

Rivera is one of 125 students enrolled in Year Up at the Wilmington University campus in New Castle. The program has another 355 participants at Peirce College in Philadelphia. In addition to six months of IT or business coursework at either Wilmington University or Peirce, students spend another six months working at paid internships at a major employer such as JP Morgan Chase.

The program is free to participants, thanks to corporate sponsorships. But, because of that, organizers have to do some work to convince potential students that they're not going to be swindled in some way. A survey of Year Up students found that 37 percent were concerned about the program before signing up, with the top worry that Year Up "could be a scam."

It's an understandable concern, said Hassan Charles, Year Up's executive director for the greater Philadelphia region, which includes Wilmington.

"They don't necessarily believe that all these resources and supports are available to them free of charge," he said. "It's been a rare occasion for them that they've had that kind of support."

That support system provides a safety net that some of these students never had before, which leads to some mistrust of Year Up's motivation.

"Change only happens at the speed of trust. It really is important that we build those relationships in the right way, so that when we encounter those barriers and issues, we will be recognized as a resource that will really help those young adults move to the next level," Charles said.

Jaqui Fletcher, a recent graduate of the Year Up program, was hired by JP Morgan Chase following his internship. One of the main things he learned through the program is perseverance.

"It taught me how to grind ... one thing that Year Up is big on is grit. I think that's another skill that I've gained here," Fletcher said.

That focus on grit is by design.

"It's not easy. This isn't a handout, it's a hand up. We don't do the work for the students," Charles said. "The professional skills training that our students receive is pretty much the 'secret sauce' of what we do ... So it's every bit as important that they learn how to take and give feedback, as it is how to write a business memorandum."

Year Up's mission is to eliminate the "opportunity divide."

"There are millions of young adults across the country who are facing social and economic injustice, and despite having the talent and motivation, they just lack access," Charles said. "At the same time, our economy needs help, there are businesses all across the country who are calling for more and better-trained talent to be able to compete on a global stage, but there aren't enough skilled workers."

For Rivera, his intensive time in Year Up is worth the opportunities that will open up once he's finished.

"It's only a year, you have that year to work hard, and that's going to step you into a job that you never thought you would have had for the rest of your life," he said. "It's crazy."

Since its inception 18 years ago, Year Up has helped more than 20,000 students nationwide. This year, 4,000 interns took part in the program around the country, 480 in the region.

Out of those students who complete the program, more than 80 percent are successfully placed in jobs with an average salary of \$38,000.

"If there's any opportunity to break the cycle of poverty in a family or a community in the span of a year, I'm going to take it," Charles said.

Interns are accepted twice a year, in January/February and July/August.

Title: 38 Pa. schools receive grants to combat campus sexual assault which affects 1 in 5 college coeds

Shippensburg University, Elizabethtown College and York College of Pennsylvania are among the 38 post-secondary institutions chosen to receive a state-funded grant to combat sexual assaults on their campuses.

The nearly \$1 million in grants is part of the state's "It's on Us" campaign now entering its fourth year to make campuses safer by giving students the tools, knowledge and skills they need when it comes to preventing sexual harassment and assault.

Pennsylvania has offered nearly \$3 million in grants over the last three years to schools to combat the problem of sexual assault that affects one in five women during their college career.

"I'm the father of two daughters," Gov. Tom Wolf said at a Capitol news conference on Wednesday announcing the grants. "To me, that number is heartbreaking. It must not be tolerated by anybody."

With presidents and officials from various Pennsylvania colleges flanking him, he went on to offer more statistics. Eight in 10 campus sexual assault survivors knew their attacker. Forty percent of them fear reprisal from their attackers.

Through the "It's on Us" program begun on the national level by former President Barack Obama in 2014, the governor and state Education Secretary Pedro Rivera said the state provides resources to campuses to implement a plan of their own creation that best meets their individual campus' needs to combat sexual assault.

Schools have used the money to offer age-appropriate consent education, bystander intervention and survivor support, along with encouraging people to take the It's On Us PA pledge to help prevent, address and respond effectively to sexual violence.

But beyond this grant program, Wolf said more must be done. He indicated that he plans to work with lawmakers to reintroduce legislation he proposed over a year ago to strengthen the response to campus sexual assaults by making it easier for students to report these incidents and track the responses of schools to them.

Tracy Vitchers, national director of It's On Us, hailed Pennsylvania as a leader in the national fight against campus sexual assault and urged passage of that legislation to

further ensure a safer learning environment for students on Pennsylvania's college campuses.

"We believe that all students no matter who they are or where they come from have a right to pursue an education free from violence and if it does occur that survivors are believed and supported in ways that are most helpful to them," Vitchers said.

Pennsylvania's efforts to combat sexual assaults come at what she called a critical moment in the nation's history.

Title IX rule changes proposed by U.S. Education Secretary Betsy DeVos that would govern how campuses respond to sexual assault and harassment claims would "fundamentally erode campus safety, survivor rights and evidence-based prevention efforts," she said.

DeVos proposes to narrows the definition of what constitutes harassment from "unwelcome conduct of a sexual nature" to "unwelcome conduct on the basis of sex that is so severe, pervasive and objectively offensive that it denies a person access to the school's education program or activity." Her proposal also limits which sexual assault and harassment cases schools must investigate to ones that occurred within campus programs and activities and are properly reported. Further, it gives the accused more rights.

Vitchers called these proposed changes devastating to students' safety if enacted, but reminded they are only proposals and a public comment period is open until Jan. 28 for people to voice their opinion about them. As of noon on Wednesday, nearly 52,000 comments had been received.

If this proposal is enacted, it would carry the force of law.

Wolf joined Vitchers in voicing his opposition to DeVos' proposal, saying it doesn't pass the smell test.

"We need to pay more attention to victims, survivors, and make sure their due process is addressed," he said.

Elizabethtown along with Susquehanna University are among the 18 colleges receiving It's On Us grants this year for the first time. Others in the midstate schools receiving grants this year include Dickinson College, Juniata College, and Millersville University.

About \$1 million dollars is going out to 38 colleges around the Commonwealth to fund efforts against campus sexual assault.

Gov. Tom Wolf announced the allocation Wednesday, and also took a moment to weigh in on federal campus assault policy.

This is the fourth year Pennsylvania has given colleges grants as part of the national It's On Us campaign.

The schools use the grants for resources like training on consent, and programs to teach students about bystander reporting processes.

During his announcement, Wolf echoed many campus assault activists in saying he's concerned about proposed changes to Title IX rules from Education Secretary Betsy DeVos.

"I think that the concern really ought to be with the victim here," he said. "The things that I think they're proposing in Washington, that she's proposing, really don't pass the smell test."

Among other things, DeVos's proposal wouldn't require colleges and universities to investigate off-campus incidents. It would give officials more options to seek a higher standard of evidence for assault charges and narrow the definition of sexual harassment.

The proposal isn't final. It's still open for public comment until the end of the month.

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Title: With perseverance Natalia Gamarra achieves professional success

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The key to Natalia Gamarra's professional success has been a mixture of perseverance, discipline, studies and a lot of networking.

Since September 2018, Gamarra joined the team of United Fresh Produce Association in Miami, as Manager, International Member Services, a job she obtained precisely for her perseverance, knowledge and the power of "networking".

"I traveled to an event in San Antonio, Texas, I paid with my own resources and there, I spoke with a United Fresh executive and told him that I really wanted to work with them, which could be of great value to the association, because of the great experience I had gained working previously with the Produce Marketing Association, that was my initial contact." Gamarra said in an interview with Abasto.

For three months, Gamarra kept in touch with United Fresh until she was finally called for an interview and given the job. "One of the people who interviewed me said that something that greatly influenced the decision to give me the job is that I'm perseverant."

This has been a constant in her life, since she was a child when she lived in Posadas, her hometown in Argentina and then when she traveled to the United States, at the age of 21, with the purpose of improving her English skills.

Although her plans were to return to work in Argentina, the lack of opportunities in her country forced her to stay in the United States, far from her entire family.

Gamarra obtained a student visa and to survive, she divided her time working as a waitress, nanny and cleaning houses, to pay for her business administration studies specializing in marketing and international business at Peirce College in Philadelphia, where she graduated with honors.

Her sacrifices paid off. After her graduation in 2006, she found work as a receptionist in a company and in her spare time she was engaged in networking to meet professionals and make contacts and thus managed to open doors that helped her advance her career.

Between 2008 and 2011 Gamarra had his first contact with the food and beverage industry when she worked for two logistics companies. To continue growing professionally, Gamarra continued her studies and obtained her master's degree in

international business, which helped her to get a job at the Convention and Visitors Bureau of Philadelphia as international tourism sales manager, where she also put into practice her knowledge of four languages, Spanish, English, Portuguese and Italian.

"That's why it's worth mentioning that the study opens doors and increases your salary, that's why I'm a person who advocates for studies," said Gamarra.

For her outstanding work and relationships with the community, Gamarra was recognized as one of the most influential Latinas in the Delaware Valley in 2012 and received the Pennsylvania Multicultural Leadership Award from the National Diversity Council.

After her successful job at the Philadelphia Convention Bureau, in 2015 Gamarra was hired by the Produce Marketing Association as manager of global business development, where she continued to expand her passion for international business and the food industry, but due to personal changes in her life, she decided to move to Miami.

Her desire to continue her professional growth in a produce association led Gamarra to identify United Fresh Produce Association as the ideal place to work and thanks to her perseverance and knowledge, she was hired in September 2018.

"I see a future with a lot of growth, I am very happy to work in an industry in which we really care about people, what they eat, business, always aware of what is happening in the industry and about advancing in my studies my goal is, later on, to obtain a doctorate in international relations," concluded Gamarra.
