The list of colleges and universities around the country that are now test-optional for admissions — meaning students can decide whether or not to submit ACT or SAT scores — keeps growing.

Here are the leading 275-plus colleges and universities on the list of more than 900 test-optional schools, a list maintained by the nonprofit National Center for Fair and Open Testing, a nonprofit known as FairTest that works to end the misuse and abuse of standardized tests. The list includes a small number of test-flexible schools, which allow students to submit test scores of their choice, including Advanced Placement scores rather than SAT or ACT scores.

VINELAND - Cumberland County College students Giselle Badillo, Jared Carll, Kelsey Grisack and Bob Novicke captured second place honors at the fourth annual regional Criminal Justice Debate held recently at Peirce College in Philadelphia.

The intercollegiate competition included debate teams from Camden County College, Cumberland County College, Drexel University, Neumann University, Peirce College, Rowan University, West Chester University and Wilmington University.

Three rounds of competition took place during which each team had the opportunity to present their best arguments on whether police should be required to wear body cameras. Cumberland County College's teams, of two students each, scored the highest number of points for one college.

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Following the three rounds of debate, the two teams with the highest points, Cumberland County College and Rowan University, moved on to the finals. This was the first time Cumberland's criminal justice team has advanced to the final round of the regional debate.

Title: New program connects young adults without degrees to jobs

For Carlos Cannon, who was born in Guam and grew up in the Wilmington area, getting accepted into a new urban youth program called Year Up has given him a chance to prove that angry, misguided kids and teens can grow up and give back to the community if given the opportunity to thrive.

The boy who, after his father left, frequently got into fights with other children, not only went on join Boys and Girls Club but wants to get a good job so he can help his single mother pay the bills, he said Tuesday. He graduated from William Penn High School in New Castle in 2013 and has been taking college courses at Goldey-Beacom College.

"Many people say Wilmington is a bad and terrible place," he told a group of community leaders and college representatives gathered at a Year Up ribbon cutting event.

He stood in a windowed atrium looking over downtown.

"Does this..." he said, extending an arm out toward the city. "Does *this* look like a bad and terrible place to you?"

The crowd murmured appreciatively.

"We are ready," he said, turning back to the crowd. "We are ready to prove everybody wrong, everybody who told us we weren't going to make it life.

"Year Up is already helping me reach my goals."

Year Up itself is a national nonprofit that focuses on empowering young adults by offering them education and professional development. Its mission is to close the "opportunity divide" by teaching them valuable job skills, helping them get college credit and connecting them with paid internships at large firms such as JPMorgan Chase.

It has been serving students in Philadelphia for several years, but just this spring was extended to Wilmington.

JPMorgan is a big part of that, and according to the company's Managing Director for Global Technology, Courtney Goodrich, wanted to reinforce its commitment to

Delaware by bringing the program to the First State and meeting its staffing needs with local residents. The firm employs nearly 10,000 direct employees in Delaware alone.

"For years we've been employing Year Up interns from Philadelphia in Delaware, and frankly, we decided that wasn't good enough," Goodrich said, adding that the JPMorgan is committed to giving back to the community.

So it approached Year Up about expanding.

Peirce College, which partners with Year Up to provide students with college credit, quickly got on board, the institution's president and CEO James Merigiotti said. He believes the college's growing partnership with Year Up is aligned well with Peirce's mission to eliminate the roadblocks impeding younger adult learners from earning a college degree.

As the students work through Year Up's skills development and internship framework, they are enrolled in college courses. Students who successfully complete the Year Up program then have the opportunity to complete their associate's or even bachelor's degrees at Peirce at a reduced cost.

The degree programs — in information technology and business administration — are offered locally, in Wilmington, and will also be available to members of the community at-large, Merigiotti said Tuesday. The Year Up program and classes are located in the Community Education Building, 1200 N. Front St.

"Even though we're Philadelphia-based, we've served Wilmington people for years and years," Merigiotti said, explaining how natural it is for Peirce to open up degree opportunities in Delaware. "We see, although it's on a smaller scale, similar opportunities here for what we do."

That opens the door for Year Up students like Richard Thorpe, who is from Wilmington but went to high school and lives in Middletown.

He actually heard of Year Up before it was expanded to Wilmington and thought he'd never be able to attend the program because of the distance.

Then it opened its new location.

"I actually tried out a couple schools, but Year Up was a big opportunity to me," said Thorpe, who in the future would like to start his own program similar to Year Up to help students enter the workforce fully prepared.

"It's been a really great experience," Thorpe said. "The staff works really hard, even after we leave the site, and really want us to be the best possible version of ourselves."

For 22-year-old Korey Bishop stumbling across Year Up was nothing short of a blessing, he said.

The former William Penn basketball star had gone to Delaware Technical Community College and studied for a couple different degrees, but wasn't exactly sure what he wanted to do next. Since joining Year Up, he's learned to put together a resume, network, write cover letters and more, he said. He's now only about 20 credits away from getting his business degree at Peirce and hopes to someday get his master's in education and open a school in Wilmington.

He went to William Penn High School, where, despite having repeated ninth grade and at one point having a grade point average of only 0.9, graduated with a 3.1 GPA thanks to help from the Communities in Schools program.

Stephanie Smith, operations coordinator for Year Up, says the program currently has 28 Wilmington students. It launched in February.

"They have huge aspirations," she said of the young adults. "They have the drive, but part of the problem is the way the corporate environment is."

Many firms like JPMorgan are only interested in candidates with four-year degrees and internship experience, she elaborated. Year Up seeks to change the perspective that degrees trump drive and talent.

It also differs from other workforce training programs in that the internships are guaranteed up front — not as a mere possibility.

"Our model is of high accountability and high support," said Joseph Coyle, executive director for Year Up Greater Philadelphia, which includes Wilmington. In "literally one year, they can go from poverty to prosperity."

"We tell the students all the time, we don't do anything for them, they do it all for themselves," he said. "It's the opportunity, providing the opportunity, that makes all the difference in the world."

"Potential is distributed equally, but opportunity is not."

Year Up Founder and CEO Gerald Chertavian says the students have always had the talent; they just didn't have the access.

"Our students have never needed a handout," he said. "They needed a hand up."

Title: Year Up Wilmington launches to train high school grads for IT and business jobs

“It’s not a handout, it’s a hand up,” Year Up External Affairs Manager **Anan Johnson** said while describing the [Year Up](#) program.

Year Up is a 17-year-old national organization that gives underprivileged young adults, ages 18 through 24, professional training and the opportunity to get in front of major corporations and advance their careers.

Year Up has programs in major cities across the country, including **Boston, Chicago, Baltimore** and **Philadelphia**.

The organization launched its Wilmington location, a partnership with **Peirce College**, in February and held a ribbon cutting this month. The inaugural class currently has 30 students, who are studying either the business or IT track. Upon completion, students will have earned up to 24 college credits.

Johnson, who is the external affairs manager for both the Greater Philadelphia and Wilmington programs, said the organization decided to open a Wilmington branch, located in the **Community Education Building**, because they saw a need for the facility.

“The employer demand is here,” he said. “There are several financial institutions and other partners here. Wilmington is a great city and there are a lot of young adults with a lot of talent, but no sustainable pathway to a career.”

The intensive yearlong course will teach students the proper way to network, handle changes at the workplace and interact with executives.

“For the first six months, students learn how to survive in a corporate setting. They also take courses at Peirce College,” Johnson said. “The following six months, students are given internships at the local companies we are partnered with.”

Those companies include powerhouses, such as **JPMorgan Chase** and **Discover**.

Johnson said the goal of Year Up is for students to either get hired by the companies they intern for or go on to finish college.

“Our motto is ‘high expectations, high support.’ We don’t give our students anything they earn it. We just provide students with the opportunity to be in front of these companies,” he said.

According to Johnson, 85 percent of graduates are either employed or enrolled in college four months after completing the program.

“Nationally, 40 percent of our students are offered a full-time position from the company they interned with, and they earn an average of \$36,000 per year.”
